FR. CHUCK'S COLUMN



Our renovation is now moving into a new phase. All of the old stone has been removed from the front of the church and the rectory, and replaced with new stone. That is why the scaffolding in front of the church is gone. Now the workers are building the new lobby and bathrooms that will occupy the space between the church and the rectory. It is really happening.

Another part of the construction is the remodeling of the front half of the first floor of the rectory, where the nursery is. The nursery will be back, with a new bathroom and a new emergency exit onto the courtyard. The rest of that floor, where the old offices of the parish were years ago, is being remodeled to be meeting room space. We can certainly use more meeting rooms! It could serve as a bride's room for weddings, a place for the family to gather prior to a funeral, as a location for children's Liturgy of the Word, for adult education gatherings, and as a meeting space for committees and small groups. We will have no problem finding many uses for it.

But how to designate this new space? It needs a name. Instead of saying let's meet in the first floor of the rectory, we should give this space a name. We already have Paulist Hall, Hecker Hall, Our Lady of Guadalupe Room, St. Augustine Room, Sts. Joan and Raymond Room and so on. In this manner we should also name this room next to the nursery.

I have several suggestions, in keeping with the overall Paulist theme in names. **St. Barnabas Room.** An early disciple, the church in Jerusalem sent Barnabas to check on the church in Antioch, which was the first to admit Gentiles into Christianity. Barnabas, from Cyprus, is described as "a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith." (Acts 11: 28). It was Barnabas who got St. Paul involved in missionary work. He was a faithful companion of St. Paul on several of Paul's missionary journeys. So he would be a good choice for naming the room.

Another option would be **St. Phoebe Room.** She too was a companion and helper to St. Paul. In Romans 16:1 St. Paul commends her to the Romans and refers to her as a deacon. Paul comments "she has been a benefactor of many and of myself as well," so she is a good patron for donors.

Sts. Priscilla and Aquila were sort of an advance team for St. Paul. He met this wife and husband in Corinth (Acts 18:2). They had been in Rome but the Emperor Claudius had expelled all Jews from Rome. They became very close to St. Paul and accompanied him on his missionary journey to Ephesus. Later they became an advance team preparing the way for St. Paul in Rome, where they were known. In Romans 16:3 St. Paul wrote: "Greet Priscilla and Aquila, who work with me in Christ Jesus, and who risked their necks for my life, to whom not only I give thanks, but also all the churches of the Gentiles." I think they should be better known, and it would be interesting to have a room in the rectory named after a married couple.

Another possibility, especially since this room will be adjacent to the nursery, is to name it after the **Holy Family.** You can't go wrong with that.

I invite all those who have participated in the renovation effort to express your preference to a member of the Parish Pastoral Council. You can find the PPC members at church wearing their blue PPC name tags. Or you can email your thoughts to the PPC at pastoralcouncil@staustin.org. The Parish Council will consider your input and early next year choose a name for this renewed room.

Stewardship Reflection

There is no question that Jesus had a way with words. The Word of the Lord is filled with what we are very familiar with in our society — sound bites if you will, which convey so much meaning. The last verses of today's Gospel from St. Matthew contain one of those short statements which carry so much more meaning. Jesus says, “The greatest among you must be your servant. Whoever exalts himself will be humbled; but whoever humbles himself will be exalted.”

In those two sentences are found the key to a stewardship way of life, which revolve around service and humility. There is no question that these are powerful words. They reveal to us all that we need to understand to be a true disciple of Christ. In his letter to the Philippians St. Paul wrote, “Though He was in the form of God, He did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but EMPTIED HIMSELF, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, HE HUMBLING HIMSELF by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.” (Phil. 2:5-8).

True humility will be ultimately exalted by God. Our society teaches us to strive to reach the top, but Jesus is reminding us that we need to regard others as more important than we are. We have two choices in life perhaps, to be self exalters, or to be God-exalted. Is there any doubt as to what we as Christians should pursue?

Catholic Social Doctrine

Rights and Responsibilities

Our Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Every human person has a fundamental right to life, and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities – to one another, to our families and to the larger society.

What are some of the things that make life truly human? The fundamental rights are food, clothing, housing, health care, education, security, social services and employment. Yes, we are called to be our brothers' and sisters' keeper and that includes our world family. We are to be advocates for all of our human family whether they are near or far.

St. Pope John Paul II's encyclical **On Social Concern**, 1987 states, "Those who are **more influential**, because they have a greater share of goods and common services, should feel **responsible** for the weaker and be ready to share with them all they possess. Those who are **weaker**, for their part... should **not** adopt a purely **passive** attitude or one that is **destructive** of the social fabric, but, while claiming their legitimate rights, should do what they can for the good of all. The **international** groups, in their turn, should **not** selfishly insist on their particular interests, but respect the interests of others."

St. Pope John XXIII in his encyclical **Peace on Earth**, 1963 states, "Every fundamental right draws its indestructible moral force from the natural law, which in granting it imposes a corresponding obligation. Those, therefore, who claim their own rights, yet altogether forget or neglect to carry out their respective duties, are people who build with one hand and destroy with another." (#30)

We need to become aware of our spiritual values and how they are brought to a better knowledge of the true God and bind us closer to God by being more united with our brothers and sisters and our response to them.

Reflection: How do I connect my spirituality, pondering the Gospels, through my love of God into concrete actions towards my fellow human beings, especially people in need. What will my response be?

DISCIPLESHIP FORMATION

Celebrating Children at St. Austin Catholic Parish

The way we welcome others in our church directly affects the way they respond to the Church, to God and to one another. Here are a few ways to let your child know that they are at home in this house of worship:

- Prepare your child for church. Discuss or role play age-appropriate behavior at home and explain the parts of the Mass, the symbols, the prayers, and actions of the priest, altar servers, lay leaders, musicians, etc.
- On the way to Mass, remind your child of your expectations for them and what they should expect to hear and see. This will give your child something to watch and listen for and prevent surprising them should you need to correct their behavior.
- Try to arrive at church a few minutes early so your child can become comfortable in the environment before formal liturgy begins.
- If your family is comfortable doing so, sit near the center aisle or near the front, where your child can more easily see what is happening at the altar.
- Sing the hymns, pray and voice the responses. Children learn liturgical behavior by copying the adults around them!
- Consider buying a "quiet book" about Mass for your child to bring with them so that if they need a distraction to help stay calm, they still feel connected to the church.
- If you need to leave Mass with your child, feel free to do so. The speakers and windows between the narthex and the sanctuary will allow you continue to participate from the back of the church. But come back inside when you can!
- After Mass provide positive reinforcement for good behavior, and discuss things that can be improved before the next weekend.

And relax! God put the wiggle in children; don't feel you have to suppress it in God's house. The presence of children is a gift to the Church, and they are a reminder that our parish is growing.
