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For the safety of our youngest parishioners, please accompany your children at all times while on campus, including trips to the restroom during mass and to and from the nursery, faith formation classes and other parish events.

The Master said "all who take the sword shall perish by the sword" (Mt 26:52). It is the policy of St. Austin Catholic Parish, therefore, to not allow open carry of weapons of any kind on parish or school grounds, with the exception of those carried by on-duty law enforcement officers. Thank you for your understanding.



FR. CHUCK'S COLUMN



Last weekend, along with all the rest of the priests serving in this Diocese, I attended the impressively titled "Course over Matrimony and Family in Reference to Ex. Ap. (Apostolic Exhortation) *Amoris Laetitia* for Bishops, Priests, Judicial Vicars (Canonist), and permanent Deacons and lay people who collaborate with Family Life and Tribunal." This impressively, if cumbersomely, titled workshop was presented by Msgr. Pio Vito Pinto, who is the Dean of the Roman Rota. The Roman Rota is the highest court in the Church, kind of like the Supreme Court, and Msgr. Pinto is like a Supreme Court Judge. Since I have learned from an early age that if you can't say something nice about a person or event then it is better to say nothing at all, I will pass over this workshop in silence.

However, being with my brother priests all weekend at this event, I was struck again at the firmly held opinion of the great majority of the presbyterate of this diocese that St. Austin is a very liberal parish. Indeed, we are viewed as a roiling caldron of far left liberalism. I find this most curious, and actually rather entertaining, since it is so far from my own experience here.

Do **you** think we are a *liberal* parish??? I don't. I have experienced some liberal parishes in my nearly 40 years as a priest, and I am pretty sure we do not make the grade. Perhaps our proximity to the University of Texas, which is far and wide regarded as the (last?) bastion of liberalism in this state, causes us to appear more liberal than we really are. Perhaps because we are rather lax about some of the niceties of liturgical law we are viewed as liberal, but this has everything to do with laziness and making things convenient for ourselves, and nothing to do with ideology.

I hope that we are experienced as a *friendly* parish. But friendliness has nothing to do with being liberal, as I have experienced some very un-friendly liberal parishes, and some conservative parishes that were most warm and friendly. I think of us as pretty much middle-of-the-road on liturgy and ecclesiology.

All this got me thinking about how I wish we were perceived. What image, thought, or feeling would I wish to come to people's minds when they think of St. Austin Parish? Well, I would like for them to think of us as friendly and welcoming. Open to diversity. Willing to embrace both Left, Right and Center. A community that puts into action its concern for those in need. A generous community. A joyful community that embodies Pope Francis' Encyclical on the *Joy of the Gospel*. Ultimately and mostly, a community that is true to our mission statement on the front of the bulletin, a community that evangelizes, that spreads the Good News.

How do you experience St. Austin Parish, and how would you like to experience this parish? What can we do to better fulfill our mission?

Adventures in the Archives

One of the biggest events in a Catholic parish is the dedication of its church. The Catholic Encyclopedia states that the Mass of Dedication celebrates the church building as an image of the universal Church built of the living stones of God's baptized people. St. Austin Church began as St. Austin's Chapel in 1908, a mission church at 21st and Guadalupe named in honor of St. Augustine of Canterbury. The Rev. Michael Smith, CSP, became the first pastor and celebrated the first solemn Mass on Christmas morning 1908. The population of Austin then was around 30,000 and there were fewer than 1,000 students at The University of Texas. During the next 45 years, St. Austin Chapel served thousands of University students as well as hundreds of Austin families.

The last Mass was celebrated at St. Austin Chapel on September 24, 1953. Demolition of the Chapel began soon afterwards. The new St. Austin Church was built just south of the Chapel and was dedicated on September 15, 1953.

Now, 66 years later, we will be making plans to dedicate a newly restored and remodeled St. Austin Church on May 27, 2018. Make plans to attend and be a part of our renewed St. Austin parish!

Catholic Social Teaching Corner

The Gospel this Sunday points to the self-sacrificing love of Jesus. No fruit can grow without the seed giving up its life for the plant. The social doctrines of the church are difficult for many because they challenge strongly held beliefs. Our teaching on life embraces the unborn and the person on death row; our teaching on solidarity asks that we ask not only about our betterment, but whether the poorest of the world are succeeding; our teaching on the environment calls us to examine how large our carbon footprint might be. This is the season conversion and sacrifice, in the last weeks of Lent what attitude or habit is God asking you to evaluate in the light of the social doctrine of the church?

Restorative Justice Part II

Prisons are filled with stories of how people who have committed acts of grave harm yet have done good things after experiencing the mercy of God. For example, some inmates who are sentenced to life in prison spend their days caring for those in hospice within the prisons. There are people who are working to provide restitution for the children of their victims. There are other stories of people who enter prison angry and victimized by society but choose another path. Over time, some inmates even serve as mentors and spiritual counselors to the young people who enter. My son benefitted from the wisdom of one of those mentors.

James Allridge III was an amazing artist. With just a box of pencil colors he could “find the light of God” within plants, flowers, and animals. Years ago, my high school aged son, Andrew, met James Allridge’s brother, Stanley, at an event benefitting the Texas Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty. Andrew asked Stanley for James’ address so he could write him to tell him how much he appreciated his art. James wrote back. A friendship began.

As the letters began arriving from death row, I, as a detective mother, managed to find every hidden letter. Andrew informed me that this was his relationship, not mine. James, in beautiful prose, spoke about the gift of freedom, family—being able to enjoy nature, friendships, and how important it was to value and cherish all of these things.

When James was given his execution date, Andrew announced he was going to Austin to testify for James instead of going to school. I immediately told him that I was going too. I listened as my son talked about how he had a great father and was fortunate to have amazing teachers at a Jesuit High School. He had plenty of good mentors. He never dreamed he would find a mentor on death row who would teach him about the value of life, love, and family.

James was executed on the second week of Andrew starting college. Despite our suggestions that he remain at school, he flew himself home to be present. It was torture to watch the victimization of all of the people who loved James. Many, many people experienced a part of themselves being killed with him. This was not restorative. This was not emulating the mercy of God that our faith calls us to do.

Who are we killing? Where is the mercy? Yes, there are people who need to be confined for their safety and ours, but we need to read the scriptures to find our way back from this pendulum swing from harsh retribution and to remember we are called to be restorative people—a people of forgiveness and mercy.

“For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.” (John 3:16).

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
